Command to Love

I am sure that we are all aware of the often quoted fact that Eskimos have 100 different words for snow. I don't know whether this is true or not, but if I ever meet an Eskimo I will be sure to ask.

Today's Gospel is about one word, a word that we use every day, that has many meanings. A word that is regularly misused and overused, that word is "LOVE". A simple four letter word that in light of the Gospel message carries with it a huge responsibility in our Christian lives.

Jesus tells us to love God and our neighbour, and when he says neighbour he means everyone. The message is simple to read but very difficult to do, particularly when life gets in the way. We can be angry at God and our neighbour, they can do things that annoy us, we in turn will do things that annoy them. Some people are easy to like and some are not, but God is asking us to love, not like. This is the example set by Jesus, the example we must all try to follow. We should try to see Jesus in everyone we meet, which should in turn inspire us to love them, wherever they are at in their lives.

This thought can then bring us to Synod, where we meet on the road with God. Last week we should have been celebrating the climax of our Synod celebrations, the road we meet on has gotten a little longer, but Archbishop Malcolm still wants us to be "The Church We Are Called to Be".
